Subject: H1N1 Virus Update

As students returned to school following their semester breaks, many college campuses across the nation reported a minor uptick in the number of H1N1 cases. Fortunately, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has said there is no overall indication that a new wave of H1N1 flu is under way. National surveillance still shows the flu pandemic generally continuing to decline.

One reason for this decline is that about 30 percent of Americans have been vaccinated against the H1N1 flu. Some 86 million Americans have received the H1N1 vaccine since vaccinations became available in late October 2009. The CDC recommends the H1N1 flu shot for anyone who wants to reduce their chances of getting this flu.

Aerojet facilities across the enterprise have endured the flu season quite well. The heightened awareness for cold and flu prevention this season has helped prevent the spread of illness at Aerojet facilities across the enterprise. With about one month remaining in the traditional flu season, we are asking employees to remain vigilant with your hygienic practices in the workplace.

Remember -- To stop the spread of germs:

- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- If you don't have a tissue, cough or sneeze into your upper sleeve, not your hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.
- Try to avoid close contact with sick people.
