Subject: Swine Influenza A (H1N1)

Aerojet's leadership committee continues to meet daily to monitor the H1N1 influenza outbreak. This communication is to provide an update from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to our Aerojet parents as well as other important reminder health tips.

For Our Aerojet Parents

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention announced yesterday that schools no longer need to close because of the H1N1 flu. However, throughout the next few days, we anticipate that school administrators will continue to seek guidance from their local public health departments regarding closures and reopenings. School health service officials will also work closely with their affiliated Offices of Education across the country and track the H1N1 influenza status very closely.

For those of you with children in schools across all Aerojet sites, it is likely that your school district is posting H1N1-relevant information on its Web site home page. Please continue to check your local sites daily for updated information.

This is also a good time, however, for parents to be extra diligent about whether or not to send their children to school. If you or your children exhibit any signs of feeling sick, please keep them home.

The Best Way to Stay Healthy

Aerojet is conducting health assessments for those Aerojet employees who are returning home from Mexico. At this time, there are no known Aerojet employees infected with H1N1 (swine) influenza.

Remember that the safety and health of all of our employees is Aerojet's top priority. Please remember to keep your work space clean at all times. If you have concerns about the cleanliness of your badge, please wipe it down much the same as you would your own personal work space.

The Centers for Disease Control recommends the following to prevent the spread of germs that cause respiratory illnesses like influenza:

- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hand cleaners are also effective. Hand-washing is the best way to prevent getting sick.

- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread this way.
- Avoid close contact with sick people.
- If you do become infected with influenza, the CDC recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.
- It is important to follow the advice of local health and government authorities.
